**Organizational Sketch:** The majority of the elevators for Saskatchewan Pool were built by other companies, shortly after the turn of the century. These elevators had enormous capacities and were influential in the grain shipping industry. The Saskatchewan Wheat Pool co-operative dates to the early 1920s. It was developed by farmers in the west who hoped to influence the price of wheat and manage their farms in a more territorial style. Many of the original elevators have been destroyed due to fires or explosion or are no longer in commission.
